



**Season Preview by

#9 Athletics – It was a quiet offseason for the Athletics...until it wasn't. I feel like I'm getting déjà vu because **Josh Rogers** (victim #1) popped up as questionable shortly before the season again. He didn't throw a pitch last season and finished 0/7 with 3 BB at the plate, but he did go 7/11 with 2 HR, 3 RBI and 2 BB with the Brewers in 2020. It sounds like Rogers is victim #1. While **Mike Karl** (victim #2) made an appearance in game one, he is out for the rest of the season and has missed three of the last four years. But the real dagger came with the news that Victim #3 **Chris Vorbeck** (9th in AVG and 11th in HR/AB during 2021-2022) is out for Season 21. To replace Vorbeck, the A's shipped over a fresh 12-pack of beer to Astros captain Bryan Benware in exchange for **Keaton Adams** because let's be honest the A's weren't going to drink it anyway. The trade is perfect for both parties because the Astros have hitting depth, the A's are in clear

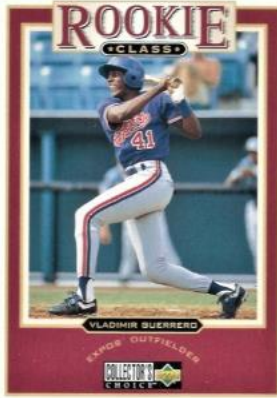
demand and Keaton's ABs should skyrocket. Keaton finished 2022 with a stat line identical to 2021 in several areas (9 Hits, 5 HR, 8 Runs, 4 1B, 5 K and 2 BB). While he did achieve career lows in AVG (.333) and HR/AB (18.5%) last season, his first two years in the league resulted in a 36% HR rate (for reference, Gus and Spencer have a 38% HR rate).

With all that turnover, the A's are going to need career years from just about everybody if they want to make the big dance. **Paul Castellano** (24th in AVG, 14th in HR/AB, 31st in K/AB) has officially fallen out of the hearts and minds of the Top 21 voters. He may have to spend some time on the mound again this season which is not a move I like given the impact he provides in left field. If Rogers doesn't show up and the A's don't make a move for a guy like Ryan O' Rear, then they're going to need a time machine to round out the innings. The historians of the league will remember **Steve Hays** as the A's workhorse who logged 53 innings across 2013 - 2016 going 6-9 with 15 K. Keaton Adams pitched 11.5 across 2019 and 2020 with a K/IP (0.87) ranking 1st and an ERA (17.39) ranking 41st (among 42 qualified pitchers). I'm not quite sure what captain **Alex Heck** wants to do with that information, but suffice it to say the A's might be winging their pitching rotation. It may be time for Alex himself to step up as he's only seen 26 AB in the past four seasons, missing two seasons altogether.

With the aforementioned changes, this could be a breakout year for **Evan Kuo**, who put on an impressive pitcher-only performance last year finishing with 29 IP (3rd), 8.62 ERA (8th), 12 K (7th) and 5 CG (T-3rd). But alright. Let's not pretend I didn't witness the 19-2 beatdown in game one which saw the Rockies and A's looking like their old selves. Yes, the Rockies are back, and we will get to that later. But sound the alarm because the Expos are now licking their chops at the prospect of climbing out of last place. Saturday Night at 7:15pm could ultimately decide which team finishes in last place, in my opinion.

#8 Expos - The Expos have stabilized from 2020 champs to basement dweller after the first season without playoff MVP and team heartthrob Brett Spencer. Outside of game one against an incomplete Astros squad, they looked uninspiring from the start last season. **Jimmy Nelson** is likely a fan favorite to watch on the mound because you generally end up seeing a strikeout or a homerun. He has been the highest volume pitcher in the first pitch strike era, leading the league in IP, K and CG (yay 😊) as well as Hits Allowed, HR Allowed and Losses (aww 😞). He has been falling further and further from Cy Wiffle contention over the years despite leading the league in strikeouts in the FPS era with 129 (28 more than second place).

After catching the first pitch from his dad on what will undoubtedly be an emotional moment on opening night, **Jeremy Worrell** will set out to improve on his FPS era metrics (31st HR/AB and 42nd in AVG). Jeremy is by no means a bad hitter, this just goes to show you how large and competitive this league has become over the years. Amongst active pitchers, Worrell ranks 15th IP, 24th ERA but T-2nd in K/IP alongside teammate Jimmy Nelson. For the past few weeks, I've been dreaming of the sensational moment when Jeremy steps onto the mound on Friday night against his former team, with Father Todd in the background yelling "Let's Play Some Ball!!! Yeaahhh!!!"

At the plate, Jimmy Nelson's hitting metrics have been trending down in the FPS era as he averages more strikeouts at the plate than dingers. He finished dead last in AVG last season (.226), and when paired with teammate **Matt Germer**, they represent the only two players to bat under .300 last season. **Evan Close** (.321 AVG, 6 HR) and **Matt Egerstrom** (.333 AVG, 4 HR) did not perform much better, so in my opinion the 'Spos may as well go all in on **Jack Leicht** (2/5, 1 RBI). With very limited opportunity, Jack stood at the top of the Expos leaderboard in batting average.

As it sits currently, it's hard to get overly optimistic about the Expos playoff hopes, let alone finishing as high as 7th place. This seems like a good segway to begin talking about **Sam "Nick Cage" Eichenlaub**, who enters the league on a rookie contract with lofty expectations as arguably the best player on the team. Sure, he is better than 13 year old Jack Leicht. But how do you tell a kid that is also a fan favorite that he has to sit on the bench? Given the opportunity, Cage could have a Jordan Smith-esque season and drastically improve the Expos hitting and fielding talents. Or he could be left to wither away on the bench (ala Will Rath). Only time will tell. When you pair the potential of Jimmy Nelson and Nick Cage, it seems superior than what the Athletics can provide this year.

#7 Marlins - What a change in the Marlins we saw year over year.

They went from basement dwellers sporting unbranded, turquoise Wal-Mart uniforms to a playoff contender sporting spirited sun hats. They seem to be taking a page out of the 2020 Expos playbook, albeit by a much different approach. In 2023, the Marlins must again rely heavily on their two workhorses, **Luke Bakula** (Thunder) and **Jordan Smith** (Lightning) to carry the rest of the team which seems to have peeked individually.

The fact that Luke Bakula went from unranked in the 2022 preseason to being #5 in the 2023 preseason is mind boggling. Is he elite or not?! Don't get me started on the voting criteria, but suffice it to say he should have always been considered for the list and probably regresses a few spots by this time next year. Luke shattered his previous FPS career highs finishing 2nd in OPS and 3rd in HR/AB, AVG & Runs. He couldn't have done it without Jordan Smith, who turned his second season into an MVP-like performance finishing with a .700 AVG (3rd), 5th in OPS and 8th in HR/AB. Despite these impressive performances, the highest FPS AVG on the team in the franchise's three years belongs to **Sam Rudnick** (.550) who has played impressively consistent so far. As far as the rest of the lineup, let's just say that collectively they rank around 43rd in AVG and 38th in HR/AB in the FPS era. The average strikeout rate of the 6 Marlins hitters is 22% which would rank them 43rd amongst active hitters. A solid fourth hitter has been the common plague for many of this league's tier 2/tier 3 teams over the years, and the Fish are no exception.

We know what we will get on the mound from the Marlins, but barring a breakout after three seasons, it doesn't seem like it can match the other top tier teams. **Trent Davis** has accumulated 51.5 IP (15th), 8.93 ERA (22nd) and 0.43 K/IP (24th) over his first three seasons while teammate **Fat J** is right there with him at 42 IP (17th), 9.05 ERA (23rd) and 0.48 K/IP (20th). Although Luke Bakula's FPS pitching numbers are actually better (77 IP, 7.86 ERA 0.43 K/IP), I'd say he is best served as the everyday left fielder.

On the positive side, **Corey Pohle**'s 4/13 performance in 2022 helped lift his career AVG to .171. However, it came without a HR, Run or RBI. Luke and Jordan were near perfection at the plate last year. If that doesn't hold or improve, this team will be in trouble given the ceiling we have seen on their pitching.

#6 White Sox - The offseason was quiet up until early Spring for the Sox. First, there was the questionable activities that took place beyond the right field fence late into the evening on 4/4/2023. Under the assumption that the pesky pine trees were going to be demolished in right field, team captain **John Calloway** had signed two more lefties to the Sox in the offseason. But the aftermath on 4/5/2023 revealed that only one of the originally planned four trees was actually knocked down. Anyways, the collective assumption around the league is that the Sox underperformed last year and should progress higher in Season 21. Initially I was on board, but a lot must go right for this team with the recent news that Coach **Ty Butler** will miss the first half of the season

against the Rockies, Orioles, Yankees, Marlins and Twins.

We knew this team was well-balanced but it's clear that **Jackson Crosley** is the team MVP after finishing 9th in AVG, 8th in HR and 5th in RBI (leading the team in each category). Team captain John quietly finished 11th in AVG and maintains the lowest strikeout rate in the league, but he ranked 24th in OPS with only 8 dingers. Ty finished 16th in AVG and HR/AB and thus is a task to replace. I would have never predicted **Derek Cornell** leading the league in strikeouts and finishing outside the Top 25 in AVG and OPS. Enough can't be said about the mentorship and tutelage that he received as a member of the Brewers. That kind of pristine guidance can't be replicated overnight, even by a general manager with the level of passion that John has. Personally, I expect significant improvement from Derek at the plate and will be investing via Fantasy SWBL.

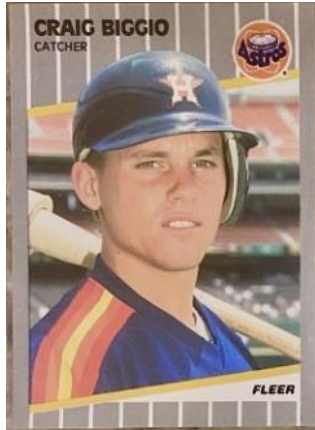
The biggest area of concern for the Sox is pitching, despite the fact that they have the 2021 Cy Wiffle winner Jackson Crosley who is coming off a season with 15 K (4th), 6.98 ERA (5th) and 4 Wins (T-3rd). The Ty Butler experiment didn't work out last year (12.5 IP, 14.40 ERA, 3.44 WHIP, 1.00 K/B). It seems clear that Ty, much like Luke Bakula (0.5 IP, 60.00 ERA, 12.00 WHIP, 4 Home Runs Allowed in 2022 lol), is best kept in left field where they each have a decent shot at adding their names to the Platinum Hands list. If it's not Ty, it could be Derek who ranks 1st in ERA (5.00) amongst pitchers with 15+ IP. If it's not Derek, it could be **Trent Steffes**. That's right, he's back and when he packed his suitcase and began his sled-dog supported voyage to St. Louis, he made sure to bring his SWBL pitching credentials with him. Trent has logged 7 IP with a 6.43 ERA, 1.29 WHIP, 5 K and 0 BB during 2017 and 2019 with the Dbax.

To round out the roster in the final hour, the White Sox signed **Tyler Omlid**, once a previous target of the SWBL Brewers in 2021. A tall, athletic lefty with a body frame that your wife can only dream of, Omlid could justifiably appear in any aspect of the White Sox depth chart, especially without Ty for half the season. He'll need to overcome the first-year jitters, a proven and valiant obstacle that talented athletes must overcome to succeed in the SWBL. If he plays like Ty Butler did in his 2014 rookie season, I'll be eating my words by Sunday.

Regardless of the Sox season long outcomes, the real battle will be Saturday at 3:30pm when the Sox take on the Marlins in the inaugural *Battle of Trent 2023*. While we know the Yanks like to golf on Friday morning, they may as well book a second tee time for 12:00pm on Memorial Day.

#5 Astros – Team captain **Bryan Benware** was all set to manage another large, deep roster before trading the #3 Fan Favorite Player, Keaton Adams, to the Athletics. I think that works wonders for the Astros as his 27 at-bats from last year can be divided out to the core players. Additionally, with 6 players on the roster, that equals 2 beers per player! I am expecting an Astro return to the wild card game after narrowly missing it last season.

Despite valiantly battling injury over the past several years, **Jimmy Stout** ranks 17th in AVG and 22nd HR/AB during the FPS era (112 ABs). He was the Astros best hitter last year finishing with career numbers in his four seasons played (7th AVG, 12th OPS, 17th HR/AB). If you average the only two FPS seasons where Jimmy played a full season, he ranks 11th in AVG (.549) and 13th in HR/AB (28%). On the bump, he is 11th in ERA/WHIP in 14 total IP. I think it's time to let Jimmy Neutron eat.

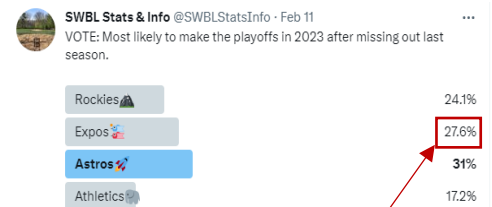
Much like Jimmy, **Cole Layton** also had his best year (of three) in 2022 finishing 15th in AVG and 20th in HR/AB. More notably, he proved himself as a Platinum Hands contender that can now be mentioned in the same breath as Chris Meador and Brian Kenney. **David Olderman** also had his best year at the plate (of three) finishing T-18th in AVG and 5th in HR/AB in 16 AB. It was also a career year for **Cam Smith** who achieved career highs in HR/AB (30%), RBI (17) and SLUG (1.326). So in summary, all four of the Astros core players achieved arguably their best performances last season and the team still managed to miss the playoffs. Concerning? Maybe. I don't know, I'm still going to pick them to make the playoffs so I don't have to rearrange this word document.

The latest rookie signing, **Kale Schweigert**, has been making waves in the MO-WIFF fast pitch league and could be the Rookie of the Year by seasons end. This prompted Astros captain Bryan Benware to make a last-minute signing to provide fielding depth and introduce some additional talent into the SWBL. Much like Eichenlaub of the Expos, it's the playing time opportunity that could limit Kaleb's ceiling rather than any lack of talent.

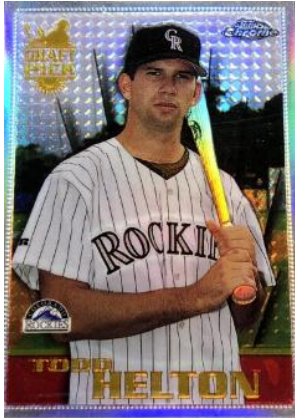
On the mound, David has emerged as the ace with FPS ranks of 9th in ERA (6.48) and 8th in K/IP (0.60). Bullpen mate Cam Smith is not far behind as he ranks 16th in ERA and 6th in K/IP (0.65). It may be worth considering some new blood in the rotation (Stout, Schweigert) considering the Cam/Dave collective has not amounted to any Cy Wiffle contention. Nonetheless, based on the balance and depth, the Astros are a popular pick to reappear in the playoffs this season and I tend to agree.

#4 Rockies – The Rockies appear to be back after easily handling the Athletics in game one. But to me, that game says a lot more about the Athletics than it does the Rockies. Most importantly for the Rockies though, is that **Chad Young** looked like the 2021 version of himself who finished Top 5 in K, ERA and WHIP. Last season, he finished with a league leading seven losses on the mound while also leading the league in batters faced and walks. His punchout power will always be there, as only Jimmy Nelson has more across strikeouts across the past two seasons. And much like Jimmy, his knuckleball looked very effective in game one, prompting significant action on Chad for Fantasy SWBL.

The offense seemed flawless and most notably, **Blake Spencer** got off to a hot start going 5/5 with 3 HR. Another proving point of the Rockies is going to be the offense of **Brian Kenney**, who went 4/5 with 2 HR in game one after finishing 27th in AVG and 31st in HR last season. BK has seemed to fallen to the #3 Platinum Hands favorite with the emergence of Cole Layton, but still provides the left field security blanket that any pitcher would desire. **Jason Worstenholm** may as well be called Jason Bestenholm because he is the most popular fantasy hitter at this point. A modest rookie performance (alongside Mo-Wiff teammate **Adam North**) is expected to only be a baseline for one of MO-WIFF's hottest hitters. With rumors of another MO-WIFF related pitching injury (*someone should investigate*), Adam North is expected to stay off the mound which means Jason could be looking at 10-20 innings pitched. Blake has 69 IP (nice, Blake) in the FPS era ranking 12th in ERA/WHIP and 19th in K/IP, leading one to believe that it may be worth giving Jason a chance. But time and time again, we've seen Blake step in and take control of the mound when things aren't going right for the Rockies.

Maybe the Rockies are back, maybe they aren't. But **Grant Boyd aka Elmer aka The Guidance Counselor** is physically back this season, providing the often described "glue" that this team apparently needs to stay cohesive. Last year seems like an outlier in the storied 11-years of the Rockies franchise. There's a high likelihood that Blake's personal concoction of Tequila/Dr. Pepper was shared with the rest of the team with poor results. If Game One is any indication, last season was definitely an outlier and the Rockies will look to turn their tough division draw (Twins, White Sox) into a playoff berth.

#3 Twins - It seems like the Twins didn't play their best ball considering they finished 38 runs below the Orioles in run differential. Additionally, the Twins won four games by a combined six runs and lost two games by one run each. The consensus around the league is a #3 rank, distinctly below the other tier one teams but significantly above the Tier 2 and Tier 3 teams. Oddly enough, the Twins beat both the Yanks and Orioles in the regular season last year. Clearly, the Twins round out an undeniable Tier 1. If you want to parlay the Tier 1 teams to each win their division, you aren't going to get very generous odds from Vegas (-625).

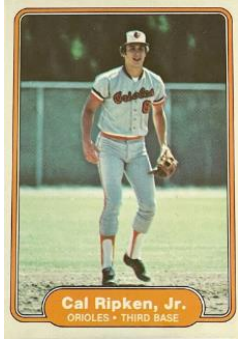
We know what we're going to get with the Twins lineup. The only question mark that was recently confirmed by Spencer Bogad which means it may or may not be true, is that **Will Rath** (0 AB in 2022) will again concede at bats to **Edloe Donnan**. A lot of people are saying this is a do or die year for Edloe Donnan. His contractual relationship with Spencer Bogad and rumors of a potential retirement looming are going to be hogging the headlines throughout the weekend. He could make a big statement for his Hall of Fame candidacy if he performs as the best DH and helps lead the Twins to a championship.

Chris Meador is 1st in Hits, 2nd in Runs & K/AB and 3rd in AVG in the franchise era and is probably still everyone's favorite for the Platinum Hands award. He's the best leadoff hitter in the game given he ranks 19th in OPS and 32nd in HR/AB. That is no concern, however, because **Spencer Bogad** and **Cory McCarthy** are both Top 5 in HR/AB and OPS in the first pitch strike era and are always in MVP contention. Edloe's FPS era ranks are nothing to write home about (29th in AVG, 11th in HR/AB, 19th in OPS) but when he plays above his projections, he gives this team a chance to win.

Unfortunately the Twins had the toughest division draw in the league (White Sox, Rockies) but with the balance and experience they have in all facets, they shouldn't have a problem winning the division. More of a guarantee though, is that they will make the playoffs.

#2 Orioles - This team proved to be very well rounded and matched the high expectations set on them in their first season. With two of the league's best pitchers, an error free defense and the second most runs scored last year, it's reasonable that there were no offseason changes for the O's.

At the dish, the standout performance last season came from **Brett Spencer** who had his best offensive season since 2013, matching or beating his career highs previously set with the Cardinals. Improvement was also noted from **Peter Leicht**, who had his best offensive season since his 2015 MVP campaign and saw his most AB since 2015 as well. Even still, Pete's FPS ranks have leveled out at 12th in AVG, 11th in HR/Runs & 14th in RBI). Nonetheless, the O's lineup seems to be working wonders for both Pete and Brett.

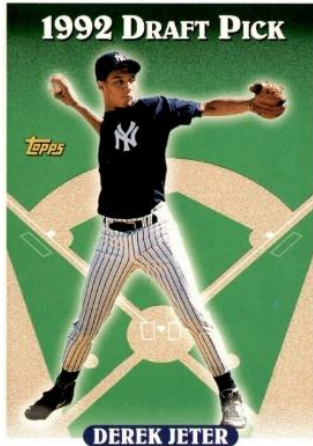
Sam Skibbe finished last season ranking 10th in AVG, 8th in HR/AB and 6th in OPS. This was pretty consistent with his FPS era ranks of 9th in AVG, 3rd in HR/AB and 6th in OPS. On the flip side, **Patrick Gatti's** return to the league saw him finish 22nd AVG and T-15th HR, arguably his worst year of the franchise era. This is promising given his proven high floor and his potential ceiling as well (MVP contention in 2017 and 2020). Collectively for these four hitters, it wouldn't be a shock to see any of them win a Yellow Slugger award, however competing for an MVP seems to be more of an uphill battle in recent years.

On the mound, no other team can sniff the jockstraps of Sam and Brett who, last year, collectively racked up 47 IP, 5.43 ERA, 1.53 WHIP, 24 K, 2 Shoutouts and 2 Saves. Both players could easily be in Cy Wiffle contention again this season. The collective FPS pitching ranks of Pete and PG aren't too shabby either (59 IP, 6.19 ERA, 1.82 WHIP, 30 K, 8 CG, 2 Saves). So to me, this is hands-down the best pitching rotation in the league. But as we've seen, you really only need two pitchers.

Team captain **John Leicht** should be able to follow last year's recipe en route to a playoff berth and another chance at a championship. Clearly, it's electric in Orioles camp and camaraderie is at an all-time high after the first annual O-Face podcast session is in the books. For the O's, it's always been about #maxeffort and with what I've heard about 2023, they're taking it to a whole new level.

#1 Yankees – There is no way this team can play as spotless as

they did last season, right? Last year, the offense was unquestionably the best in the league. Team captain **Scott Pohle** rounded out the offense as the least effective hitter (while being Top 13 across the league). It was just a couple years prior where Scott finished Top 3 in AVG in 2020 and 2021. As far as the best 2022 Yankee performance, that belongs to Gus Skibbe who became the first player in SWBL history to collect the Holy Trinity in the same season (MVP, Cy Wiffle and a Championship).

Sam Bakula has never been hotter after earning his third championship (2nd in the franchise era) and setting FPS career highs in AVG, RBI and Runs.

After his 2022 season, Sam now ranks 5th in HR, RBI and HR/AB in the FPS

era. He is clearly the #1 DH in the game, a position that is only going to grow in popularity as the league's players continue to age. Props to Sam for strategically locking himself into the DH role at such a young age.

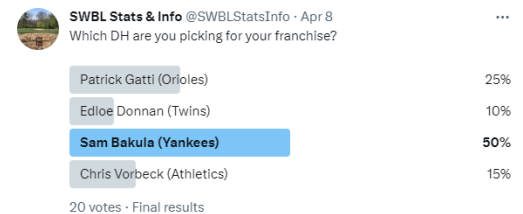
Like Paul Castellano's pristine pitching performance in 2022, **Gus Skibbe's** pitching line is guaranteed to regress in 2023, right? I'm sure he would tell you the same. He finished his 2022 Cy Wiffle campaign with 30 IP, 7-1 (1st), 6.17 ERA (2nd) and 17 K (3rd). His FPS pitching ranks clearly validate his current Cy Wiffle hype (4th in ERA, 6th in WHIP, 10th in K/IP). But oddly enough, 14 players have spun a shutout in the franchise era and Goose is not one of them.

Much like Luke Bakula, **Kevin Pohle** flew up the offseason Top Player listing from unranked to #11 after finishing 2nd Hits, 4th AVG, T-5th HR last year. He's also made a home for himself in right field as a staple at a position that many teams seem to cycle guys through.

If I search for a flaw for the Yankees, it's pitching. If Gus regresses, can Scott's knuckleball rise to the occasion? Scott has proven to be a serviceable pitcher much like Bogad, Blake, Paul, etc. who can help their own cause at the plate. It's hard to know if teams are going to embrace the target on the back of the defending champs, or chalk it up as a loss and play for another game. I haven't encountered a single player around the league that has any team other than the Yankees favored at #1. I'm pretty sure the SWBL Preseason #1 curse died a few years ago after a powerful run, but hell, let's try to recreate it.

Award Predictions

MVP

1. **Gus Skibbe (Yankees)** – After breaking single season records in AVG, OBP and SLUG en route to a championship, you can't bet against Gus.
2. **Spencer Bogad (Twins)** – Pretty much a lock to bat .600+ with 18+ HR at a minimum.
3. **Cory McArthur (Twins)** - His past three seasons have produced strikingly similar results that land him in the Top 5 MVP conversation (17 HR, 29 RBI, 28 Runs, 2.339 OPS)
4. **Brett Spencer (Orioles)** – The 3-hole in an Oriole lineup saw Brett shatter his previous career highs in AVG, HR & HR/AB, RBI, Runs, Hits and OPS. He's old, but he ain't done yet!
5. **Luke Bakula (Marlins)** – Similarly shattered the same career highs as Brett, and is rejuvenated with Jordan Smith by his side.

1. **Sam Skibbe (Orioles)** – Consistently high strikeout counts + a sub 4.00 ERA last season.
2. **Brett Spencer (Orioles)** – Is there anyone out there that can consistently string together HRs against the Top Gun?
3. **Jackson Crosley (White Sox)** – 27 IP, 15 K and a 5.30 ERA are solid 5-year averages in a class amongst fellow Cy Wiffle winners.
4. **Will Rath (Twins)** – In the same amount of FPS IP as Gus (136), Will performed better in ERA, WHIP, K/IP, BB, HR Allowed, Wins, Losses and Shutouts.
5. **Gus Skibbe (Yankees)** – Maybe it was the 19 runs allowed in the championship game that has me weary on Gus.

Platinum Hands

1. **Chris Meador (Twins)** – Didn't commit an error last season but had 75% of the total chances that Cole did. Maybe the ball rolls differently this year.
2. **Cole Layton (Astros)** – Even after just one dominant year, it makes sense.
3. **Brian Kenney (Rockies)** – One documented error and now he's #3. Crazy world we live in.
4. **Luke Bakula (Marlins)** – Luke's range is a bit wider than the top 3 but he provides highlights.
5. **Peter Leicht (Orioles)** – With Ty at 50% utilization, Platinum Pete is happy to hop in the Top 5.

Batting Title

1. **Gus Skibbe** – His .796 AVG in 2022 was nearly .100 points higher than second place.
2. **Jordan Smith** – A .700 AVG in his first full season was second only to Gus.
3. **Chris Meador** - .601 FPS AVG is 3rd all-time.
